ALUMNI NEWS

Alumni listed by year of participation

Howard Rubenstein, France 1951 and Judith (Selig) Rubenstein, France 1959, have had their host families visit them in the U.S. Howard's adaptation of Prometheus Bound attributed to Aeschylus was planned for production Off-Broadway this fall, but has been postponed due to the pandemic.

Daniel Rosenblum, Sweden 1957, remains connected with his host brother and has built a relationship with his host brother's daughter. Dan also made use of his Experiment training to conduct his own "Experiment", when a German family welcomed him into their Hannover home. That relationship is now in its 4th generation, and Dan believes it did much to heal "war wounds" on both sides—that, "at no time in history, including the Third Reich, has the Experiment been more relevant."



Ronald Moore, Denmark 1960 and England 1962, visited two boys from the host families on his Experiment last fall. This visit was his ninth and their families keep up with Christmas letters and emails. Says Ronald, "It is great to be able to see world issues from their perspectives.... As I have known since my Experiment Days, in foreign countries their ways may be different than ours, but different could well be better."

Richard Edelson, *Poland 1961,* remains in touch with his host brother, Mirek, and was able to visit him and his wife last

summer. Mirek said, "Richard when you were first here, we only had one color, gray. Now Warsaw is as multicolored as any European city."

Adaline "Rocky" Sullivan Thomas, Switzerland 1963, has travelled internationally to give care to underserved children. It was through The Experiment that she, "learned the language of all cultures and all children who are in need. How we end up using those lessons is as variable as our Experiment experiences."

Randolph Hobler, France 1963, has just published 101 Arabian Tales: How We All Persevered in Peace Corps Libya. Randy remembers visiting his host family, Jeannette and Marcel Bardot, in 2017 and recalls Marcel's story of when he was taken prisoner by Nazi soldiers and escaped with the help of a group of musicians. One musician gave Marcel a violin so he could pretend to be one of them and leave with the group. He kept that violin his whole life. 101arabiantales.com

Richard Briggs, Norway 1964 and Japan 1966, has reconnected with Joseph "Rudy" Salinas, his group leader from his Experiment to Japan, and the pair are working with The Experiment to send a student from Southern California to Japan next summer. Dick says his own Experiment to Japan shaped his life—he was subsequently stationed in Japan as a naval officer, obtained an MA in Japanese studies at the University of Michigan, a JD from Northwestern University, and provided legal advice to companies based in Japan for almost 40 years.

Kathy Hanaway, Sweden 1968, together with Mary Harris Dibble, Sweden 1968, decided to reunite their Experiment group, though they not been in contact for 52 years. They were ultimately able to reconnect the entire group, including their group leader, who are all alive and well and living in seven different states across the U.S. Two group members live

eight minutes from each other in New Mexico and didn't know it. The group now enjoys regular Zoom get togethers. The group is pictured below then, and in one of their recent Zoom calls.



Ellen Peel, France 1968, received a Ph.D. in Comparative Literature and taught English and Comparative Literature for 35 years. She is a Professor Emerita at San Francisco State University and is still in touch with her host sister.

Steven McArthur, Canada 1968, credits his Experiment summer for opening his eyes to understanding that, "racism was a part of the human condition and a universal blight that saw the 'other' as less than whatever the dominant group happened to be." Steve later became a social worker and then a management consultant working to promote understanding of individual difference. He's been named "Peacemaker of the Year" by the Jeannette Rankin Peace Center and received the "George Award" from the Missoula Chamber of Commerce.

Karen Matic, France 1970, majored in French at the University of Illinois and at the Sorbonne in Paris, and later taught French. Karen, her family, and her host sisters stay connected with visits between the two families.

Virginia Bennett, France 1982, went on to lead a 25-year Foreign Service career, and is still in touch with some members of her group, including her group leader.

Lara Schwartz, Switzerland 1987, became a lawyer, civil rights advocate and professor. Today, her work focuses on building communities where all voices can be heard, founding the Project on Civil Discourse at American University. She also recently published the book, How to College: What to Know Before You Go (And When You're There).

Julie Nordstrom, Mexico 1999, is an active advocate for dyslexics in public schools. Reflecting on the current racial justice protests and remembering her Experiment group, Julie wrote, "The nature of the diverse background of students from the U.S. coupled with the intercultural experience is one of the most positive, challenging, beneficial and impactful experiences a person could have."

Ansia Ebony Picou, Mexico 1999, reached out to the alumni office upon recognizing Carla Lineback's photo as her group leader. She continues to be in touch with much of her group, including Julie Nordstrom mentioned above, and has been working in development.

Justin Cherman, Italy 2003, has always been interested in the culinary experience and during his Experiment took charge of the host families' farewell meal. He since went on to attend the Culinary Institute of America and now owns Thank You Popcorn, a gourmet popcorn business based in Massachusetts. thankyou-popcorn.com
